

Enjoying the Holidays with Less Stress

The holidays can be a joyful time, but they can also be tricky, especially for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD), their families, and caregivers. Special foods, bright decorations, schedule changes, different sounds and smells, and crowded gatherings can make things stressful. Planning ahead can help everyone enjoy the holidays more.

Here are some tips to make the season fun and less stressful:

- Involve Your Loved Ones in Planning: Talking about plans helps everyone feel prepared. If someone with I/DD is part of the planning, let them help make choices, but don't overwhelm them with too many options. Use "could" instead of "should" when making decisions. This helps them feel included and in control.
- Focus on Favorite Traditions: The holidays are full of fun traditions, but trying to do everything can be too much. Talk about your family's favorite activities and pick the top two or three to focus on.
- Watch Out for Triggers: Loud noises, bright lights, new foods, or crowded places can be hard for some people. Think about what might bother your loved one and plan around it. Avoiding these triggers can prevent meltdowns or stress.
- Keep Comfort in Mind: Sometimes holiday outfits can feel scratchy or tight. Talk with your loved one about what they like to wear and try to find something comfortable that fits the occasion.
- Stick to a Schedule: Holidays often mean changes to daily routines, which can feel overwhelming. Try to keep things as normal as possible and let your loved one know about changes ahead of time. Give them extra time to adjust between activities.
- Manage Expectations: Talk about the experiences to come whether it's new people, places, foods, smells, and sounds, so they know what to expect. Also talk about concerns they may have and the type of behavior that may be expected during different celebrations.
- Plan for Transitions: Let the person know when things are going to change. It might be a large change from the normal schedule or just moving from one activity to another. Giving the person enough time to adjust to the coming change can help lessen behaviors and meltdowns.
- Consider Needs when Traveling: Many people travel to celebrate with family and friends. Extra planning may be needed to accommodate the person such as travel modality, picky eating, daily routines in a new place, and extra time needed.

With a little planning, you can make the holidays more enjoyable for everyone. Celebrate the season while keeping things calm and joyful for your loved ones. And remember, not every one will be happy with the decisions made during the holiday season, at that is okay.
